Mental Health NSW Budget 2016-17



The NSW Government will invest a record \$1.8 billion for mental health services in 2016-17. This increases the NSW Government's investment in mental health services by \$106 million from last year's Budget. This includes a specific focus on suicide prevention, young people and community mental health services.

Suicide prevention



\$8 million over four years for a new suicide prevention fund to support mental health NGOs to prevent suicide in our community.

\$3 million for Lifeline to continue supporting their vital crisis services.





\$500,000 for Specialist Suicide Prevention Training for 10,000 non-mental health clinicians.

Suicide is the leading cause of death for young people aged between 15 and 34 in Australia.

\$11 million for a statewide rollout of the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) GOT IT! Teams, which includes a new \$9 million for 15 new teams to assist with early intervention.

\$5 million for **Older Persons Mental Health Teams**, an increase of **\$3.5 million** to assist people in Central Coast, Mid North Coast, Nepean Blue Mountains, Northern NSW, Sydney and South Western Sydney Local Health Districts.



Rural and regional communities



Over \$630 million for mental health services in the nine rural and regional local health districts.



\$3.8 million for the Centre for Rural and Remote Mental Health to support the mental health of rural and regional residents.



An additional \$1 million for improved technology to support rural tele-health initiatives for rural hospitals in Hunter New England, Mid North Coast and Northern NSW Local Health Districts.
